Academic Engagement Network Visiting Professors

University of Hartford Hillel

Your grant will fund two speakers from the Academic Engagement Network (AEN) to speak at UHart. AEN mobilizes networks of university faculty and administrators to counter antisemitism, oppose the denigration of Jewish and Zionist identities, promote academic freedom and advance education about Israel.

Museum of Jewish Heritage and Harmony on Broadway

University of Hartford Hillel

Your grant will subsidize admission for 20 UHart students and two staff to visit and tour the Museum of Jewish Heritage in New York, and group admission to see Harmony, a new Broadway musical. Students will pay for their own train transportation to/from NYC.

A/V Equipment for Events and Coffeehouses UConn Hillel

UConn students are interested in bringing more music events to Hillel, but lack proper equipment. Your grant will help students purchase a soundboard, mic stands, lapel mic, stage monitor, cables, etc., for student coffeehouses, open-mic nights and guest lecture events.

Kicks 'N Hoops Sports Club Friendship Circle

Your grant will empower local teens to bring together children with special needs to experience the thrill of sports, develop teamwork skills, and most of all, have fun! Support Fundraising Services

Jewish Family Services

JFS is undergoing a transition in its Development Office. Your grant will support the "on boarding" of a new Director of Advancement by a local expert consultant.

It has been more than 10 years since JFS updated its offices. The look and feel of a space can impact the way people feel, and JFS wants to ensure the best possible support. Your grant will invest in new office furniture, including replacing sterile-feeling chairs in clinicians' offices with comfortable seating for clients.

JCC Maccabi Games

Mandell Jewish Community Center

The JCC Maccabi Games bring more than 3,000 Jewish teen athletes from around the globe to participate in Olympic-style sports competitions. The Mandell JCC is building a team of six teens to go to the JCC Maccabi Games in Houston in August 2024. The Games provide an opportunity to further build Jewish identity, but each athlete must pay or raise \$2,400 to cover participation costs. This may not be affordable for some families, so funds are needed to subsidize these costs through scholarships.

Music for Older Adults

Mandell Jewish Community Center

The Mandell JCC wants to add another music appreciation program for older adults, with performance and educational components, six times per year. Your grant will underwrite the costs of adding this program.

Tzofim Scouts Mandell Jewish Community Center

Camp Shalom wants to bring the Tzofim scouts back to camp after a four-year hiatus. These Israeli scouts will share their experiences and backgrounds with the campers, deepening the camp's connection to Israel and enhancing Israeli culture programs. Estimated cost is \$4,000 per scout.

Holocaust Survivor Services Isolation Reduction Programs

Schoke JFS wants to introduce wellness programs that will connect over 100 Holocaust survivors to crucial supports and reduce survivors' isolation. Your grant will help pay for these online and in-person programs.

Storytime for Your Soul: A Coping and Resiliency Program for Young People Schoke Jewish Family Service of Fairfield County

Your grant will fund a program that helps young people use story telling and volunteer experiences as a way to learn valuable coping skills. Families will complete chesed projects, including assembling personal care items and laundry care packages. Parents will gain support around topics such as helping children through difficult moments of transition, experiences of grief and loss, and social challenges.
